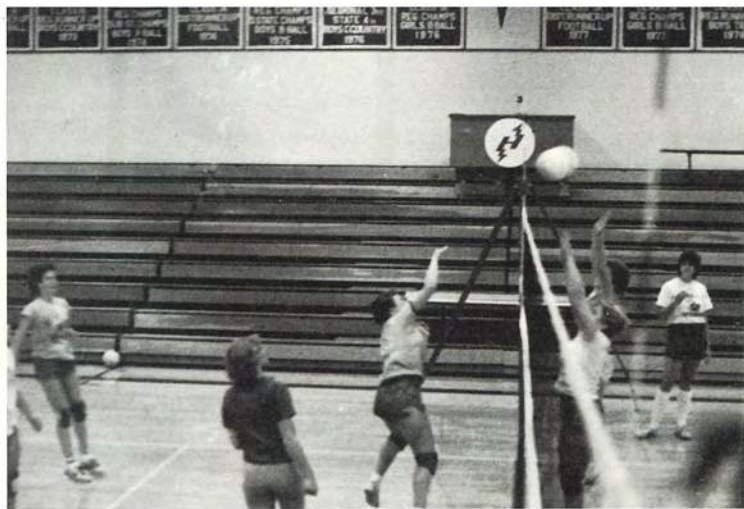

New Curriculum Questions



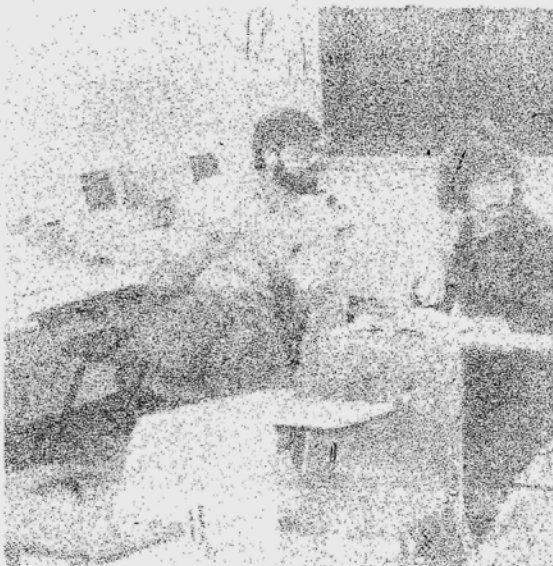

Two new requirements for graduation were added this year to the curriculum - Senior Composition and Computers. Each class is one semester long, but students have the option to take Computers for the whole year.

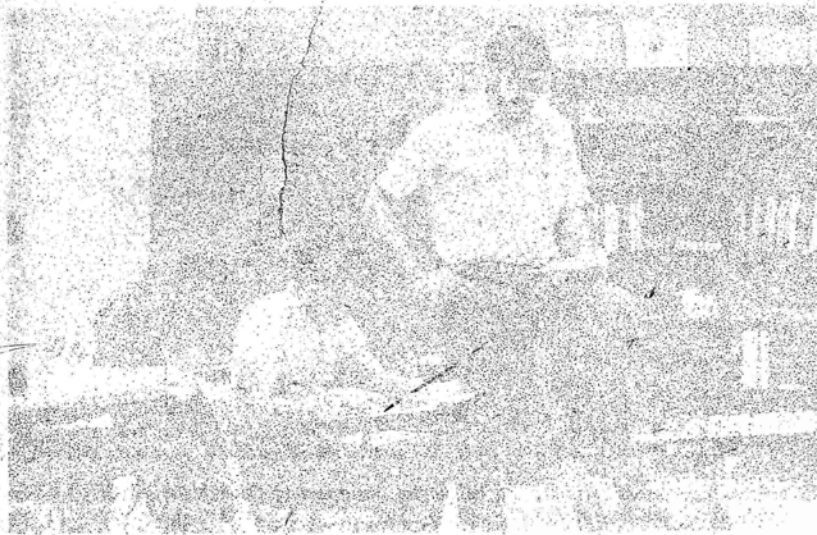

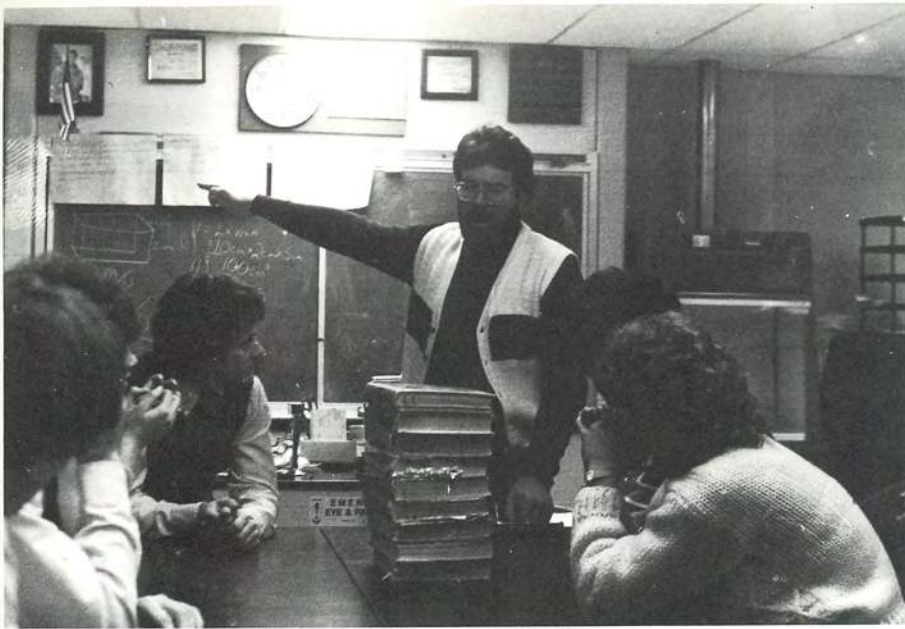

Business

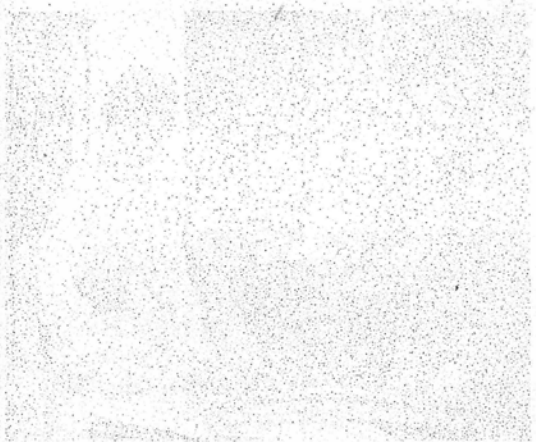

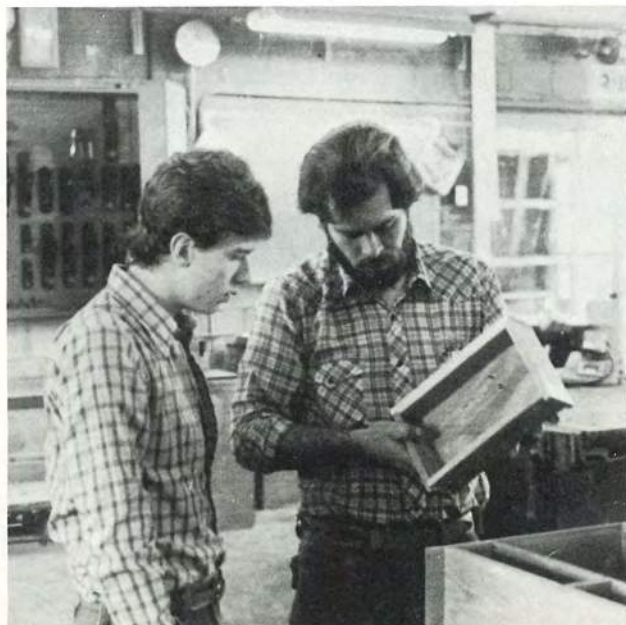

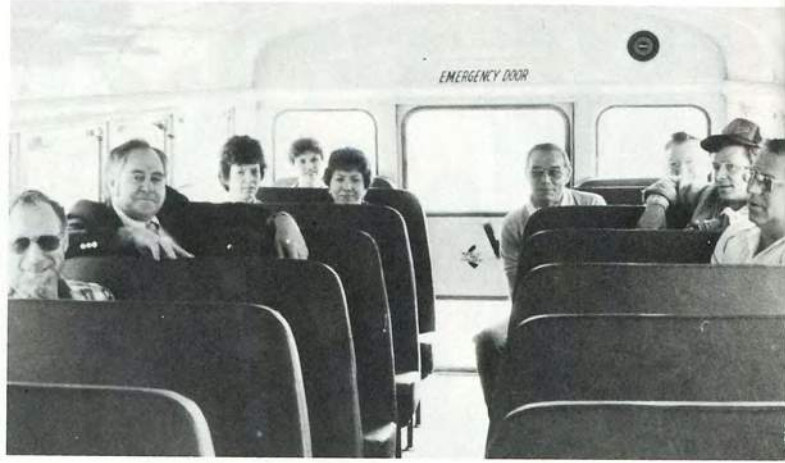

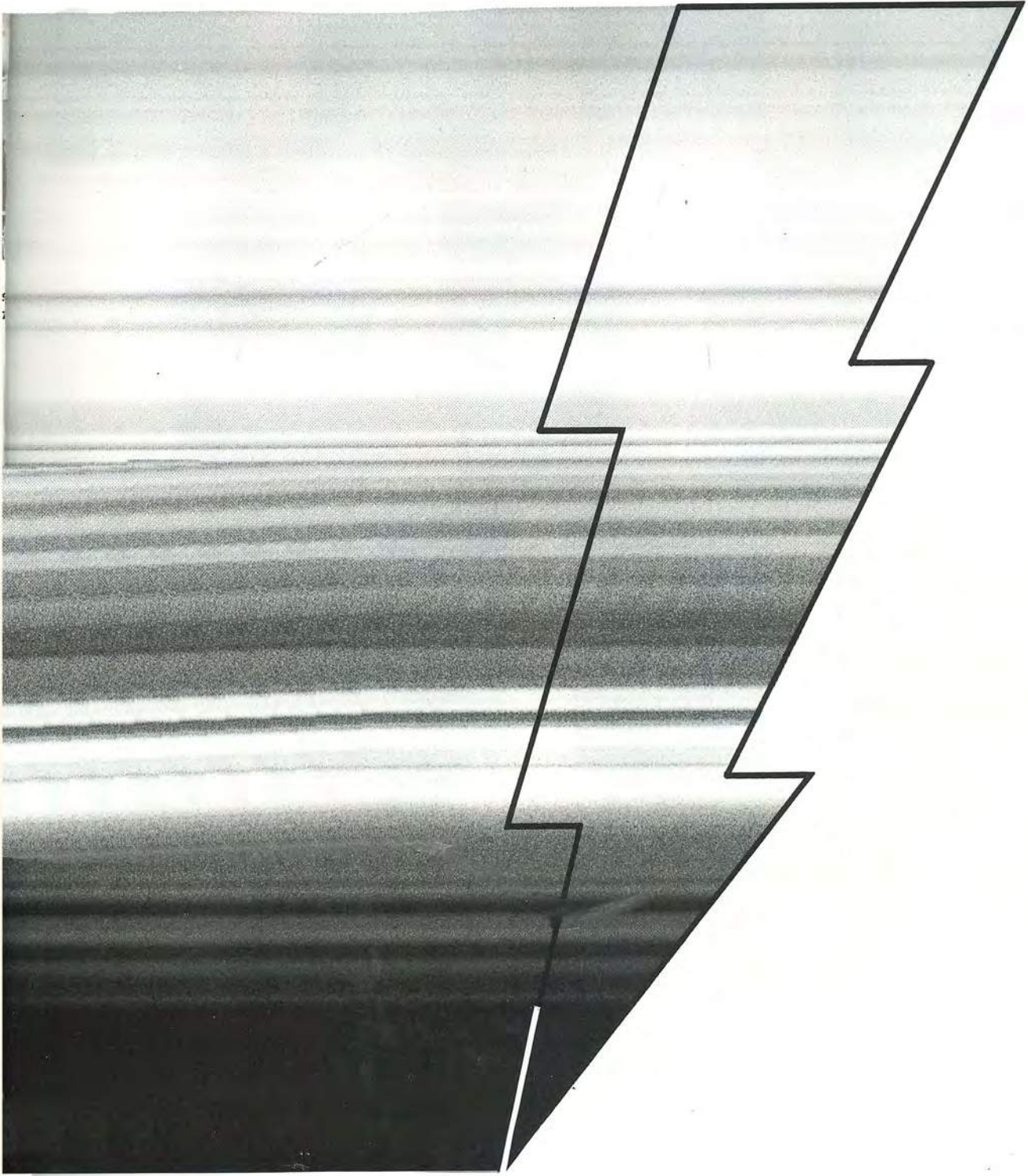

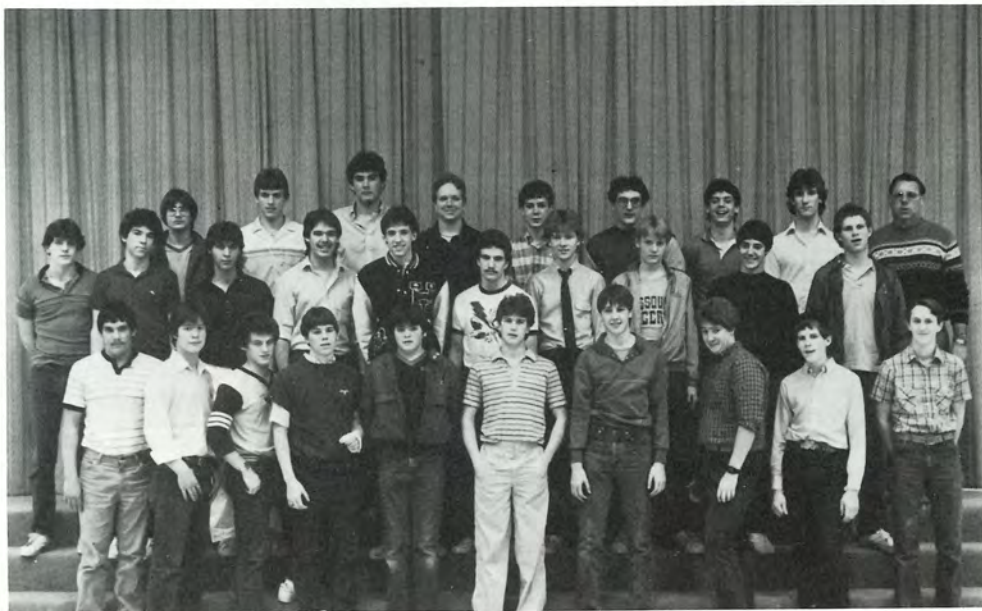

On Oct. 12, Highland faced Linwood for their homecoming win when they destroyed Linwood 46-0.



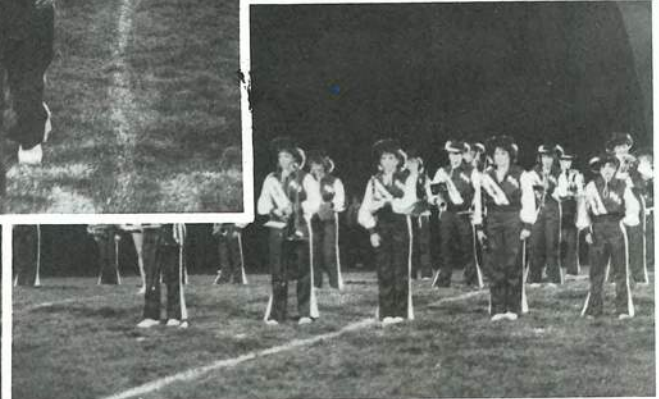
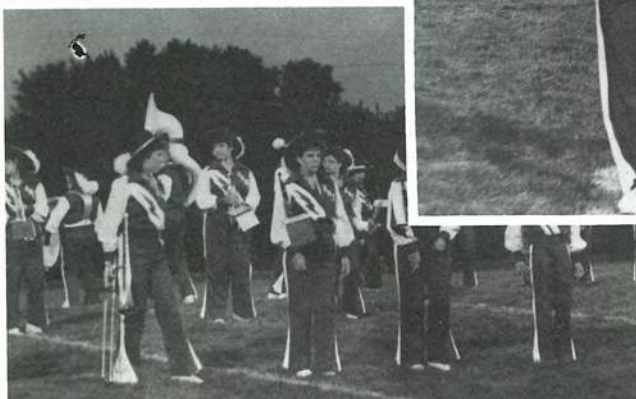

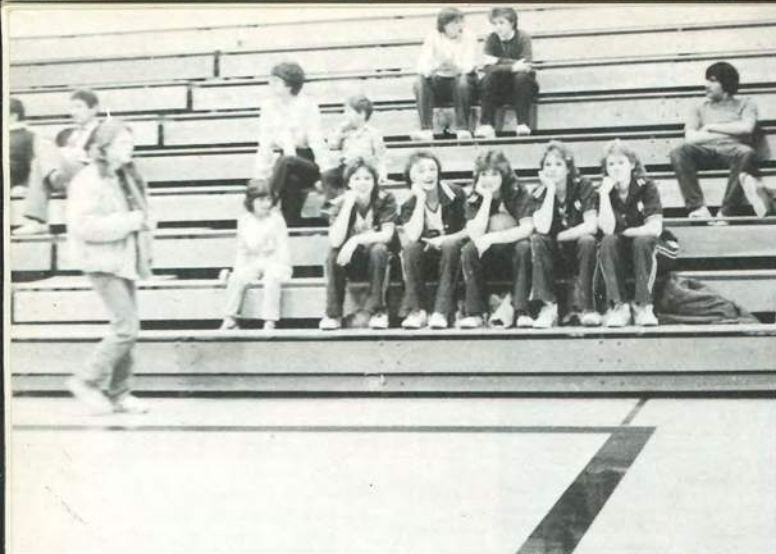
