





Mrs. Joyce Rush, the new English teacher, worked hard to develop a speech and remedial reading class this year. She also taught senior composition, as well as the other required English courses.







The junior American history class pays close attention to Mrs. Parish's lecture.











Dena has been a valuable asset to the music program at HHS, and she is indeed a dedicated musician.








