Compensation of Legislature

The sum of \$5 per day is allowed for each regular session until \$300 has been paid, and until \$150 has been paid for each special session. Also each member is allowed \$7 per calendar day of a session for his expenses. In addition, 15c per mile is allowed a member for his mileage in going to and returning from the session at its commencement and end.

County High School Levy ------4.68 mills

*Consolidated Rural High School District 1

The county general high school budget is raised by a tax levied by the county commissioners. The tax levy shall not exceed six mills on all the taxable tangible property of the county.

The amount each high school receives is based on the average daily attendance.

1 to 100 Pupils ------\$200.00 100 to 200 Pupils -------165.00

The distribution of the general high school fund to individual high schools shall be made by the county treasurer on February 1, August 1, and November 1 of each year.

The county general elementary school budget is raised by a tax levied by the county commissioners of not more than two mills on all taxable tangible property of the county.

The fund is distributed on the per teacher per pupil basis. The law provides \$500 per teacher and \$15 per pupil except in counties in which a two mill levy will not raise sufficient amount, then the law provides that the fund shall be prorated. In Doniphan county two mills raised approximately two-thirds of the budget.

Distributions are made by the county treasurer on February 1 and August 1.

General Information

1. The School Board Is the Governing Body

The school board is the governing or managing body of the district. Each member of the board serves in a double capacity. He is a member of a governing board that reaches its decision by a majority vote or a unanimous vote. He is also a servant or officer of that board, and is bound by law to do what is required of him to carry out the decisions of the board. He is not an independent official, or an officer in his own right. Each member is entitled to cast one vote at board meetings. That is his part in making decisions. When that decision is made he is bound by it. If he neglects or refuses to perform the duty incumbent upon him by reason of that decision, he is derelict in duty and subject to removal.

2. Residence In District

Each board member is required to reside in the district. If he removes his residence therefrom, he automatically vacates his position, and the county superintendent is required to appoint someone to fill the vacancy within ten days after such removal.

3. Resignation of Board Members

Members may resign to the annual meeting, which meeting should proceed to elect a successor. At other times the member may resign to the county superintendent, who is required to appoint someone to fill the vacancy. Such appointments hold until the next annual meeting.

4. Meetings of the Board

No action of the board is fully legal unless it is taken at a meeting of the board at which all members are present, or at which a majority is present after all have had an opportunity to be present through being notified.

5. Minutes of Board Meetings

Board meetings are business meetings and minutes of such meetings are necessary as an official record of business done. They should be written by the clerk and signed by at least two members of the board. A copy of the minutes must be sent to the county superintendent.

6. General Duties of the Board

(1) The school board of each school district shall

maintain the schoolhouse in good repair; shall keep it a clean, comfortable, and healthful place for the purpose for which it is intended.

- (2) The board shall contract and employ a qualified teacher or teachers for and in the name of the district, which contract shall be in writing, and shall specify the wages agreed upon, and shall be filed with district clerk.
- (3) The school board may dismiss a teacher for cause. Any teacher so dismissed shall be granted the right to appeal to the county superintendent within ten days after such dismissal, and the decision of the county superintendent on such appeal shall be final.
- (4) The board shall provide maps, charts, teaching equipment and other instructional material, recreational and playground equipment necessary to the successful operation of the school.

7. Admission of Elementary Pupils

Children who will be six years of age by January 1st are eligible for admission to school at its opening in September. Children of less than that age cannot claim admission and should not be admitted.

8. Admission of Rural High School Pupils

Any pupil residing in the high school district who has completed the course of study provided for common school districts by the state superintendent and who can present a certificate thereof signed by the county superintendent of public instruction, shall be eligible to admission to the rural high school.

Provided: That pupils sixteen years of age or over may be admitted to such rural high schools by action of the rural high school board and may be assigned to such classes as the principal may determine.

9. Transportation or Compensation Mandatory

Kindergarten and elementary pupils must be transported or compensation paid in lieu thereof if the pupils live farther than 2½ miles from school. The distance is measured along the usually traveled roads. The supreme court has held that the measurement of distances for the purpose of compensation shall be from the front door of the pupil's residence to the front door of the schoolhouse.

The rate of compensation shall be five cents per mile

for not to exceed two round trips per day. The rate of compensation may be raised above five cents per mile if the school board applies to the county superintendent for such increase.

10. Transportation or Compensation Discretionary

Rural high schools may transport their pupils to high school or they may provide compensation. The compensation rate is five cents per mile for not to exceed two round trips per day. This compensation rate may be increased.

11. Districts May Contract with Each Other

School districts may contract with each other to provide transportation for their respective pupils. A high school district may contract with a grade school district and vice versa.

12. School Bus Transportation

All traffic must stop for a school bus when it is loading or discharging pupils, providing the driver has extended the semaphore stop arm. The stop arm should be used at all stops on regular bus routes. There must be a semaphore stop arm on each school bus. "School Bus" must be printed on the front and back in 8-inch black letters. Exit doors must be marked with words, "Stop on Signal." All lens in the flasher lights must be red.

13. Holidays

Legal holidays in Kansas are:

- (1) Lincoln's birthday.
- (2) Washington's birthday.
- (3) Memorial day.
- (4) Labor day.
- (5) Columbus day.
- (6) Armistice day.

14. Place of the Teacher.

The teacher is employed to teach school. She holds a certificate legally qualifying her for the work. The organization and instruction of the school therefore are in her hands and not those of the board. Difficulties in this regard must be referred to the county superintendent.

15. Teachers' Contracts

1. A teacher's contract continues for the succeding

year unless:

- (a) The board gives written notice to the teacher by March 15th of their intentions to terminate the contract or
- (b) the teacher gives written notice to the board by April 15th that she does not desire a continuation of the contract.
- (c) Continuation of contract in common and rural high school districts shall be subject to the annual school meeting voting to maintain school for the succeeding year, and subject to the adoption of a satisfactory budget for school operation.
- 2. A teacher's contract may be changed at any time by mutual consent of both parties concerned.
- 3. Until a teacher is released from her contract she has no authority to enter into a written contract with any other school board in Kansas, for any part of the time covered by her present contract. Any teacher found guilty of violating this law may have her contract suspended for all or the remainder of the school term if a written complaint is signed by two-thirds of the members of the board of education first employing the teacher, if said teacher is found guilty at a hearing before the state board of education.
- 4. Teachers' contracts may be made any time after February 1st for the following school year, subject to voting to maintain school and the adoption of a satisfactory budget at the annual meeting.

16. Payment of Salary

It shall be unlawful for any district board, board of education, board of trustees of a community high school or other agency controlling any elementary or secondary public school or public junior college in the the state of Kansas for the particular kind of work salary of any teacher, supervisor, or administrative officer who does not hold the teacher's, supervisor's, or administrative officer's certificate which is valid in the state of Kansas for the particular kind of work which he performs.

Substitute teachers shall hold a certificate valid for the position in which they are substituting.

All teachers, including substitute teachers, must register their certificates with the county superintendent, or as otherwise directed by the state superintendent.

17. State Requirements

The law requires the observance of the state course of study for public schools, the use of state adopted textbooks, and all tests, examinations and standards adopted by the state board of education. If a teacher or principal fails to do so, he may be removed from his position.

18. Religious Instruction

Religious instruction in a public school is not authorized by law. The reading (not teaching) of the Bible without note or comment is permitted in public schools.

19. Control and Use of Building

The board has charge and control of all school property and may permit the use of the school building for such purposes as it deems proper.

20. Annual Meeting

The annual meeting of common school districts shall be held on the first Friday in June. Rural high school meetings shall be held on the day preceding the date of the annual meeting of common school districts.

21. The Budget

Fundamental to each school year is the annual budget. It is prepared by the board and posted with notices for the annual meeting. The form for the budget is prepared by the state accountant, but is sent you by the state tax commission through the county superintendent. The budget should be for the total amount of expected school expenditures. It should be expressed in dollars.

Balances on hand in the treasury are not to be deducted in estimating the budget. This is a frequent error, and may cut school income distressingly. The budget is to be considered and adopted at the annual meeting.

There can be no school income without a budget. The expenditures for a school year cannot exceed the amount of the adopted budget. The school board can be held responsible for any amount spent above the budget.

23. Expenditures and Contracts by Boards of Education The budget should be itemized, and should include

all items for which expenditures may be expected. The board is authorized to transfer estimates wholly or partially from one item to another in the budget.

23 Expenditures and Contracts by Boards of Education

No expenditure involving an amount greater than five hundred (\$500) dollars can be made by a board of education, except in accordance with the provisions of a written contract, and no contract involving an expenditure of more than one thousand dollars for the purpose of erecting any school building or making any improvements can be made except upon sealed proposals, and to the lowest responsible bidder. (Chap. 395, Sec. 38, L. 1951) See Chapter IX, Art. 3.

24. Expenditures by School District Boards

The school board must authorize in advance all obligations incurred in the name of the board (Chap. 395, Sec. 20, L. 1951).

25. Penalty for Violation

Any member of a governing body, clerk, secretary, or treasurer who knowingly violates any provision of the law is guilty of malfeasance in office and is subject to removal, and, in addition, for any violation or neglect or refusal to perform any duty, is guilty of a misdemeanor and is subject to a fine of not less than \$10 nor more than \$1,000 (G.S. 10-1121.)

26. Fire Protection

House Bill 145 defines "School Building" and requires that all doors open outward and be operatable from the inside, and also sets out several new requirements pertaining to fire protection and inspection of school buildings.

27. County Institute

County institute for teachers shall be held in August and shall not be less than two days or more than five days in duration. All elementary teachers, high school teachers, and junior college teachers under supervision of the county superintendent are required to attend the institute for which they shall be paid at the same daily rate as their contract calls for during the regular term.

28. School Board Conventions

The county superintendent may hold one or more conventions for school board members per year for which board members are to receive \$5.00 per meeting.

Criteria for Accrediting Elementary Schools

- 1. Fire extinguishers checked and approved and a fire drill held each month.
- 2. Indoor flag and outdoor flag with facilities for displaying them.
 - 3. Dental examinations or plans in progress.
 - 4. Library books and childrens magazines purchased.
- 5. Regular board meetings held with minutes sent to the county superintendent. (At least four each year).
 - 6. State adopted textbooks used.
 - 7. School follows the state course of study.
- 8. All reports required from board members and teachers promptly and accurately made and sent to the proper authorities.
 - 9. All teachers certified for the positions they hold.
 - 10. A minimum school term of eight months.
- 11. School board keeps the school clean, comfortable, and healthful.
- 12. School board provides such maps, charts, teaching equipment and other instructional material, recreational, and playground equipment necessary to the successful operation of the school.
 - 13. Only pupils of legal school age enrolled.

An elementary school must comply with the thirteen statutory requirements listed above in order to be accredited by the state department of public instruction.

Requirements for Custodian's Certificate

Section I. Subject to the approval of the executive committee of the Doniphan County Custodian Association and the county superintendent, all custodians, who were employed during the school year 1952-1953 shall be eligible to receive a custodian certificate valid for a period of two years. Provided:

- 1. An application and the required fee are filed with the secretary of the Doniphan County Custodian Association on or before September 1, 1953.
- 2. The applicant shall submit with said application a recommendation, signed by the school board and the principal by whom employed, and a health statement from a physician.

Section II: Subject to the approval of the executive committee of the Doniphan County Custodian Association and the county superintendent, certificates may be issued after September 1, 1953 for a two-year period to new applicants who meet the following requirements:

- 1. An application and the required fee shall be filed with the secretary of the Doniphan County Custodian Association.
- 2. The applicant shall produce a certificate of attendance at a custodian workshop approved by the vocational education department or the county superintendent within the last nine months prior to the date of said application.
- 3. The applicant shall submit with said application a recommendation signed by the school board and the principal by whom employed and a health statement from a physician.
- 4. No person who has reached the age of 65 years and has had no prior services as a custodian shall be eligible for a certificate.

Section III: All custodian certificates may be renewed for a two-year period providing the renewal requirements are met and the application is approved. Renewal Requirements:

- 1. Said custodian shall have attended a majority of the custodian meetings during the period that his certificate was in force.
- 2. Shall have attended one workshop for custodians, which was approved by the vocational department of education or the county superintendent.

- 3. All applications must be made within 90 days from the date of expiration of certificate.
- 4. Custodian shall file with his application a recommendation signed by the school board and principal by whom employed during the validity of his certificate, and a health certificate signed by a physician.

Requirements for Classification of the Elementary Schools

The class B schools must have all the features of a class C school, plus those listed for class B. A class A school must have the features of class C and B, plus those listed for class A.

Constitution of the D.C.T.A.

Adopted April 5, 1948

Article I-Name

Section I. The name of this organization shall be Doniphan County Teachers Association.

Article II-Purpose

Section I. The purpose of the organization shall be to advance the educational interest of Doniphan County; to carry out the local functions of the K.S.T.A. and N.E.A., to elevate the standards of instruction; to create in the county at large a deeper sense and knowledge of the importance of public education and its relation to the general welfare; and to subscribe to the Code of Ethics as exemplified by the K.S.T.A. and N.E.A.

Article III—Affiliation

The Doniphan County Teachers Association shall be affiliated with and be a part of the Kansas State Teachers Association and the National Education Association.

Article IV-Membership

Section I. Membership shall be composed of all teachers and administrators who are actively engaged in elementary school, secondary school, or college work within Doniphan county, and who pay the annual unified dues to the N.E.A. and K.S.T.A. and D.C.T.A.

Article V-Officers

Section I. The officers of this association shall be a president, a vice-president, a secretary and a treasurer. The office of treasurer and the duties thereof shall be vested in the office of the county superintendent of schools.

Section II. The executive committee shall consist of the officers elected annually and three board members.

Section III. Upon adoption of this constitution, the first board member elected shall serve one year; the second board member elected shall serve two years and the third board member elected shall serve three years. At the expiration of their respective terms, the board members shall be elected for a term of three years each.

Article VI-Election

Section I. The term of office for the president, vicepresident and secretary shall be for one year, or until their successors are elected.

Article VII-Duties of Officers

Section I. The president shall be an ex-officio member of all standing committees and shall sign all orders drawn upon the treasurer. He shall call meetings of the executive committee of which he shall be chairman, suggest policies and plans of work for all standing and special committees, and shall be held responsibile for the progress and work of the association. The president shall appoint all regular and special committees. He shall preside at all regular meetings of the association and perform all other duties that properly fall upon a presiding officer.

Section II. The vice-president shall preside in the absence of the president and shall perform any other duties that shall be incumbent on him as a result of the inability of the president to perform them.

Section III. The secretary shall keep a careful record of the proceedings of each meeting. He shall, as directed by the president, carry on the correspondence pertaining to the affairs of the association. He shall cooperate with the executive secretary of the Kansas State Teachers Association. He, together with the president, shall certify to the executive secretary of the Kansas State Teachers Association two official representatives chosen to represent the association in the sectional delegate assemblies.

Section IV. The treasurer shall receive all funds belonging to the association, pay out the same on orders signed by the president, keep an itemized account of the receipts and expenditures, and make a written report of same to the membership regularly.

Section V. The executive committee shall have full authority to speak and act for the association between meetings of the entire association. It shall hold such meetings as are necessary to formulate policies for the association and to devise effective means for carrying out recommendations made to it by the board of directors of the Kansas State Teachers Association through its officials. It shall give general direction to

the entire program, make recommendations to be acted upon by the membership, and fill all vacancies which arise between elections.

Article VIII-Meetings

Section I. Five or more regular meetings of the association shall be held annually. The annual election of officers shall be held at the final meeting of each school year. The president, with the advice and consent of the executive committee, shall designate the time of the meetings.

Section II. Special meetings shall be held at the call of the president; or the president shall call special meetings upon the written request of ten per cent of the members.

Article IX-Committees

Section I. There shall be the following standing committees, appointed by the president, subject to the approval of the executive committee: Program, Athletic, Public Relations, and Music Committees.

Section II. Any other committee deemed necessary or desirable may be set up by the president if approved by the membership of the association.

Article X-Quorum

A quorum for all meetings of the association shall consist of a majority of the total membership and quorum for a committee shall consist of a majority of committee.

Article XI-Amendments

The constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote at any regular meeting of the association.

Amendment I

All teachers holding unified membership cards will be admitted free to all regular school activities in the other schools of the county. (October 23, 1948).

Amendment II

The president of this association shall be alternated each year between the elementary and the secondary groups of the county. (March 25, 1949).

Amendment III

Annually, at the fall meeting, a nominating committee of three persons—one from the high schools, one from the graded schools, one from the rural schools—

shall be appointed by the president with the approval of the board of directors. This committee shall present a list of candidates for the elective offices at the time of election. Other nominations may be made from the floor at the time of election if any member so desires (March 18, 1950).

Amendment IV

Amendment I of this constitution is hereby repealed. (October 12, 1953).

Constitution of the Doniphan County School Board Association

Article I-Name

Section I. The name of this organization shall be Doniphan County School Board Association.

Article II-Purpose

Section I. The purpose of the organization shall be to advance the educational interests of the schools of Doniphan county and to create in the county at large a deeper sense and knowledge of the importance of public education and its relation to the general welfare.

Article III-Affiliation

The Doniphan County School Board Association shall be affiliated with the State School Board Association.

Article IV—Membership

Section I. Membership shall be composed of all school board members of Doniphan county actively engaged in elementary school, secondary school or college work within Doniphan county, and who pay the annual dues of five dollars per district.

Article V-Officers

Section I. The officers of this association shall be a president, a vice-president, and a secretary-treasurer.

Section II. The executive committee shall consist of the officers elected annually and three board members. Past president shall be ex-officio member of the executive committee.

Section III. Upon adoption of this constitution the first board member elected shall serve one year; second board member elected shall serve two years, and the third board member elected shall serve three years.

At the expiration of their respective terms the board members shall be elected for a term of three years each.

Article VI—Election

Section I. The term of office for the president, vicepresident and secretary-treasurer shall be for one year, or until their successors are elected.

Article VII-Duties of Officers

Section I. The president shall be an ex-officio member of all standing committees and shall sign all orders drawn upon the treasurer. He shall call meetings of the executive committee of which he shall be chairman, suggest policies and plans of work for all standing and special committees, and shall be held responsible for the progress and work of the association. The president shall appoint all regular and special committees. He shall preside at all regular meetings of the association and perform all other duties that properly fall upon a presiding officer.

Section II. The vice-president shall preside in the absence of the president and shall perform any other duties that shall be incumbent on him as a result of the inability of the president to perform them.

Section III. The secretary-treasurer shall keep a careful record of the proceedings of each meeting. He shall, as directed by the president, carry on the correspondence pertaining to the affairs of the association. He shall cooperate with the executive secretary of the Kansas State School Board Association. He shall receive all funds belonging to the association, pay out the same on orders signed by the president, keep an itemized account of the receipts and expenditures, and make a written report of same to the membership regularly.

Section IV. The executive committee shall have full authority to speak and act for the association between meetings of the entire association. It shall hold such meetings as are necessary to formulate policies for the association. It shall give general direction to the entire program, make recommendations to be acted upon by the membership, and fill all vacanies which arise between elections.

Article VIII-Meetings

Section I. Two regular meetings of the association shall be held annually. The annual election of officers shall be held at the final meeting of each school year. The president with the advice and consent of the executive committee shall designate the time and place of the meetings.

Section II. Special meetings shall be held at the call of the president; or the president shall call special meetings upon the written request of ten per cent of the members.

Article IX-Committees

Section I. There shall be the following standing committees appointed by the president, subject to approval of the executive committee: Program committee, Public Relations Committee, Nominating committee.

Section II. Any other committee deemed necessary or desirable may be set up by the president.

Article X-Quorum

A quorum for all meetings of the association shall consist of a majority of the total membership and quorum for a committee shall consist of a majority of the committee.

Article XI-Amendments

The constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote at any regular meeting of the association.
