"The academic progress made this year showed a commitment to education," said Principal Don Cash.






The school made AYP in mathematics. The junior class received a free day from school as a reward for making AYP requirements.

Math, Accounting, & Science

How did you like your math class?

"I liked it but it was a hard class for me." -Kallie Koehler Mrs. Stephanie Affield taught four math courses: pre-algebra, Algebra I, business math, and math fundamentals. This was the second year she taught here.

In pre-algebra the students and reinforced built their mathematical skills. In Algebra I students learned how to simplify expressions, evaluate and solve equations and inequalities. Business math was a course that students mathematical processes used in the fields of business and finance. Math fundamentals sought to rebuild math skills students may have lost.

Mrs. Michelle Newkirk also taught four math courses: geometry, Algebra II, college algebra, and calculus. Students took geometry as a mathematical system through deductive development of relationships in a plane and space. They learned about segments, angles, and con-

gruency, and how to do proofs. The Algebra II class studied the complex number system and functions. College algebra applied most of what had been learned in lower classes. Calculus focused on reasoning and technical skills.

Mr. Kevin McNorton taught general science. chemistry. and biology. earth/space sciences. General science taught the introductory materials for all the classes. In chemistry they learned about the science of matter. Biology students learned about the emphasis of molecular and cell biology. Earth/space was a laboratory class focusing on the study of space and forces that shape the world.

Mrs. Jene't Brown taught accounting, where they learned about basic finances.



Spanish & History

Spanish I and Spanish II were both taught by Ms. Mary Ann Eisiminger in her second year of teaching Spanish at Troy.

Spanish I was an introductory Spanish course. Students went through the fundamentals of Spanish with grammar and how to pronounce words. Spanish II furthered the knowledge obtained in Spanish I with a more difficult view of words and how to speak.

When asked about how Spanish went, senior Tyler Carskaddon said, "We learn a lot of useful things in this class that will help us later in life... it's easy to pay attention and behave in this class."

Mr. Lyle Rockey taught three social science courses: American history, world history, and geography. American history covered the Untied States from the first settlers in America and the development of the New World to the Civil War and

how the United States became a modern nation.

World history covered the history of the world from the 1700s to the 19th century, from the end of the agricultural period to the industrial revolution, and then finally to the modern civilizations of today.

Geography covered North and South America, Australia and island nations, south Asia, Southeast Asia, and China. The students learned about animals, the environment, cultures, history, climate, and features of each place. Along with the cultures, they also learned about ther government, as well as the religion and language of each area.

When asked if she liked her history class sophomore Nicki Stanton said, "My history class is very informative, and easy class to be in. I really like this class."

The English classes were all taught by Mrs. Martha- Jean Rockey and Mr. Jeremy Prudden.

Mr. Prudden taught English I which covered grammar, essays, and reading comprehension.

In English II, Mr. Prudden taught creative writing, where the students wrote stories; Poe and mysteries, where they learned about horror stories; and grammar.

Mrs. Rockey taught sophomore speech, where sophomores gave various types of speeches with different requirements; mythology, where they learned about ancient beliefs; and news writing, where they learned to write journalistically.

English III and IV were combined. Mr. Prudden taught science fiction, junior research paper, high school vocabulary, and writing. Mrs. Rockey taught early American literature, genre writing, early British literature and modern American literature.

Mrs. Rockey also taught public speaking as a dual-credit course with Highland Community College. The students gave presentations on themselves and informative and persuasive speeches.

The publications staff, advised by Mrs. Rockey, attended the fall journalism conference at Kansas University and regional contest and state competitions.

"It was a really busy year. We had a lot of work to do, but it was worth it. We are a very good team; everyone was really helpful. My favorite part of the year was going to the journalism contests at Kansas University and Kansas State University," said senior Olga Zhuk.

Five students earned state awards. Olivia Bennett got second in advertising. Bennett, Zhuk, Katie Smith, Baileigh Jenkins, Braden Grossman, Katrina Tharman, and Jacob Winkel got Honorable Mention.



The P.E. classes offered were weights and freshman P.E./health. They were taught by coach Derek Jasper.

Freshman P.E./health was a required class and went over the basics of exercising and physical health. It could also help kids discover other physical activities that they might enjoy for a lifetime and deliver many different activities for students who weren't interested in traditional competitive sports.

Weights was a class for sophomores, juniors, and seniors. The purpose of this class was to lift weights, such as bench, squat, and hang clean. They also did other physical exercises such as jump rope, box jumps, ladder drills, and cross court exercises.

When asked about how weights helped her, junior Kelli Marriott said, "Weights helped me get stronger and faster for the numerous activities I was involved in. It also helped having a lot of the girls in the class that play

Multimedia worked with all types of media, audio, video, and animation. They learned how to make and edit videos and pictures, and create layouts.

The art class received many awards at DVL art, and many were first or second place.


The speech team competed well in every meet and always took home numerous medals. Five speech entries earned I ratings at state festival.

The Troy Middle/High School band, which consisted of 43 members, was directed by Mr. Matt Allison.





Art I, Art II, advanced art were three art courses offered.


Art students did very well. They helped decorate the field for Homecoming and also did many decorations. For example, they created the castle for the "Disney Dazzle" concert, which was April 24.





Fall Play Dear Phoebe





Junior Tanna Meng said: "As student director I can say that we started out rough but ended up as a great performance."













NHS and Quill and Scroll







Olivia Bennett and Katie Smith both excelled equally in high school. They were named covaledictorians.


