I was in Topeka at the Historical Society last week and visited with them about your request. They said the microfilm is \$25.00 a roll plus \$1.50 handling charge. I looked up the Indiana census for 1840 and found Samuel in Cass County, Indiana, where he should have been, but I cannot find anything before that time. I looked in books which had estate, wills and death records for Cass County, to no avail. I think I will look in our local Mennon Library next.

I hope your son is doing alright. I am sure that his back problem is tough on all of you.

William Paine, Gent., attorney of John Burr ridge, Esqr., was summoned to answer Joseph Hardwick of a plea on the case. The plaintiff by Simon Robins his attorney saith Paine stands indebted 5904 pounds of tobacco by account. Paine saith he oweth not any part thereof. Jury, James Orchard, John Higgins, George Wood[], George Thorne, Thomas Gilson, Henry Kirk, John Gardner junr., Roger Tilson, Wm. Rust, Jno. Trammell, Richard Hancock and Wm. Chandler, doe say Wee find

John Scott vs. John Bolton, Rector, husband of Madam Spencer. Abated for variance between the writt and plaint.

George Hardwick was attached to answer John Wright of a plea that he render unto him two hogsheads of tobacco which hee owes and detaines, which hee hath acknowledged to bee a just debt by ordering the tobacco by notes to John, which tobacco was otherwise disposed of before John the same could receive. John by Willoughby Allerton his attorney complains that George to defraud John the same doth unjustly refuse and deny, whereupon he saith he is damnified 2000 pounds of tobacco.

The defendant by Robert Brent his attorney pleaded that he ought [owed] him not any thing by law. For that the plaintiff produced two notes for two hogsheads of tobacco which by the oaths of John Headley and Robert Self appeared to be otherwise disposed and the tobacco unpaid to Wright, the Court think fitt not to admitt him to make his law. Ordered that George doe pay John two hogsheads of tobacco.

To the Honorable Court of Westmoreland Sitting in Chancery, In most humble manner your dayly orator George Hardwick of the county aforesaid complaining sheweth that whereas Wm. Clarke late of the county aforesaid dieing testate did by his last

tobacco, the Sheriff made return that he had attached the estate of Collins in the hands of Mr. Richd. Medcalf, and for that the defendant did not appeare, judgment is granted him.

Capt. Thomas Youel by his petition setting forth that Edward Paine his servant had severall tymes run away but more especially for the space of nine dayes and that Capt. Youel had been at 500 pounds of tobacco charge in regaining his servant as did appeare by the oath of Richard Martin, it is ordered that Edward Paine serve his master the full terme of seven months after his former tyme is expired.

Mr. Benjamin Blanchflower withdrew his appeale entered the last Court in the difference betweene him and Mr. Robert Carter and Mr. Henry Rosse, trustees of John Crabb, deceased.

Elizabeth Quissenbury returned an inventory of the estate of John Quissenbury junr. together with the appraisement.

Elizabeth Quissenbury exhibited an account against the estate of her deceased husband John Quissenbury junr. for funerall expences &c amounting to 670 pounds of tobacco. It is ordered that shee bee allowed 440 pounds of tobacco.

Upon an issue joyned between John Scott and John Newton and John Sturman, executors in trust of Capt. William Hardidge, the plaintiff demanding 1902 pounds of tobacco on ballance of accounts, part of which account being proved by Alexr. Gordon and the rest by the plaintiff's own oath, judgment is granted the plaintiff.

It is ordered that l.1.6 bee allow'd unto Mr. Jno. Newton and Mr. John Sturman as executors in trust of Capt. Wm. Hardidge in discount of the above judgment before any execution.

Dear Mr. Beale:

Enclosed are the copies of research and documents that I have located at the North West Missouri Genealogical Society and also information from here. I haven't found too much here in this county which is surprising. I did find the following on page 240 of the Do. Co. Illustrated 1916: "The Troy Times was established 3 of September 1886 by A.W. beale who had previous newspaper experience. The first issue was a five column quarto and on 3 December 1886 changed to an 8 column folio. Mr. Beale continued until 3 September 1897 when Frank Elliott purchased the paper, his first issue being 10th of September 1897."

Our large cemetery which is at Troy. Mt Olive. has not been read and for that we are embarrassed. It needs to be done badly for those looking for their people. I hope to get it finished this summer.

I have not been able to connect Samuel Beale with his ancestors yet and may not be able to do so. I had that problem with my Mendenhalls for some time until I ran across a book while in Houston, TX. I found it at the Clayton Library near MD Anderson Hsp. It is strange where you will find things they have always told me. I did not expect to find a record of my people there but rather in Indiana, Iowa, Michigan, N.C. or PA. It just so happened that one of the descendants lived in Houston who was working on that line. When I found it, I was just browsing before returning to the Hospital.

It may be in St. Joseph but their resources are limited for the USA. The Mid-Continent Public Library in Independence MO. have one of the largest resources in the midwest. I get there every once in a while. There may also be some history books on early Indiana which will help.

Our son had back surgery yesterday. A neurosurgeon fused his 6th and 7th vertebra. We're supposed to be retired and our son, Jerry, is running the farms now so you can see what this means for us. Busy busy. Jerry has a lot of hogs. He also has two boys 16y and 15y who help but they require supervision. .quite a bit. We, also, have a small seed business on the side. They are finishing planting soybeans today on a farm southeast of Troy.

Sorry I didn't find any connection for Samuel Beale but some where, some place is a record that will show it.
