## BERRY OF VIRGINIA &amp; MARYLAND.

This is an old English family of Norman extraction and claims descent from the French Ducal House of Beri. The family for many centuries, was one of much consequence in England; owned large estates there and possessed much influence. The arms borne by the Berry was: "ermine on a bend engrailed sable: three fleur de lis, or: crest gules, three bars, or: a Griffins head erased per pale indented, argent and gules (silver and red). Several pieces of plate in the possession of members of the Berry family of maryland, are stamped with this coat of arms. The first of the name of whom we have direct ancestral record was:

## No. 1.

James Berry, emigrated to Virginia about 1640, and later removed to Maryland. He received grants for several large tracts of land in what is now Prince George's County: ~~one~~ of them, "Mount Pleasant." on the Patuxent River, was surveyed for him in 1653, but was conveyed to Richard Marsham in the same year, and by him to Basil Waring. James Berry died about 1685, and after his death a suit was brought against the estate by a woman who claimed to have married him in England, but she was proven an imposter, and sentenced to the ducking chair. His son William was defendant, and it was shown that his father had married in Virginia.

## No. 2.

William Berry (James<sup>1</sup>Berry) a son of James Berry, the emigrant, was probably born in Virgini, and came to Maryland with his father when quite young.\*\*\* No other Berry is shown as owning land in

Prince George's County (or Calvert then) during that period; so it seems probable that he was the only member of his father's family that settled in that portion of Maryland. It is not known who he married, or just when he died. He possessed large estates, and had several surveys made for his children, who were apparently minors at that time. In 1670 "Thorpland, nine hundred acres," was surveyed for Richard Berry, and in 1679 "Morefields" for Benjamin Berry, both apparently his sons.

No. 3.

Benjamin Berry Sr, (William Berry<sup>2</sup> James Berry<sup>1</sup> Berry)

a son of William Berry was probably born in Prince George's County Maryland about 1670. He received from his father large landed estates which he added to, and when he died had laid the foundation for the extensive properties owned for generations by his descendants. In fact, the Berrys for many years possessed more land than any other family in Southern Maryland. Mr Berry was clerk of Piscataway Parish, which was then very large, and in 1715 was a commissioner of Prince George's County. His wife was Mary \_\_\_\_\_ (maiden name unknown). His will was proven February 10, 1710, and he divided his estate between his wife and four children, mentioned his son-in-law, Richard Keene, and devised two hundred and fifty acres to Thomas Clagett, of "Weston."

No. 4.

Jeremiah Berry, (Benjamin Berry Sr, William Berry, James Berry.) the youngest son of Benjamin Berry, Sr., and his wife, Mary, was born in Prince George County, Maryland in 1712. He had more than a thousand acres of land near Upper Marlborough, and resided on an estate now owned by Mr. Elisha Berry, where he is buried. He married Mary Clagett, daughter of Richard Clagett, of Croome, and his wife, Deborah (Dorsey) Clagett. She was a sister of Rev. Samuel Clagett, the father of Bishop T. J. 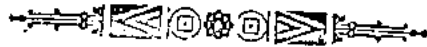

I give and bequeath unto my loving wife Mary Berry my house and tract of land with all the improvements thereon and on which I now live containing by estimation one hundred and Seventy eight acres, also the whole of my negroes except two girls by name Esther and Hannah, with all my stock of everh kind and household and kitchen furniture to hold and enjoy the whole of the above property diring her natural life, but it is expressly my will and desire that my wife shall pay to my daughter Susanna in Stock and furniture the sum of three hundred and twelve dollars at the time of marriage or her arriving at the age of twenty one and being an equal proportion which my son Allen and my daughter Betsy Hughs and Nancy Long have received from my estate. I give and bequeath to my daughter Rachel Smith the before mentioned negro girl Esther to her and the heirs of her body forever which make her equal proportion.

Also included in the dedication was a large plaque which Captain Jewell had secured from the U.S. Government in acknowledgement of the service of John Berry in the War of 1812.

Mrs. Una Marie Gilbert discussed the history of the John Berry family, a book compiled by her, Thelma Puckett and Captain Day Jewell. Mrs. Gilbert called attention to each family in the book and presented the members of each family.

The John Berry Association was organized with Mrs. Marie Gilbert, President; John Marshall Jackson, Vice President; and Thelma Puckett, Secretary-Treasurer. An Advisory Committee was appointed:

Mrs. Sidney Berry, widow of Andrew Jackson (Bud) Berry, Jr. received the silver spoon for the oldest member present. Brad Garlitz received a spoon as the youngest. Mrs. Weatherbee of Santa Barbara, California, traveled the longest distance. Eighty guests were present. The meeting adjourned to meet again at a place and time to be decided by the Committee.

After the meeting a short church and communion service was held for all wishing to partake. Telefus Cawyer was in charge, assisted by Jack Pope, Jr., Homer Garlitz, and Lynn Hassler. All joined hands and sang "Blessed be the Tie that Binds."

#### THE 1958 JOHN BERRY BOOK

Many things contributed to the organization of our Association, but nothing was more significant than the activity incident to the publication in

1958 of the small book entitled *The John Berry Family of Berry's Creek*. The thirty-two pages of text and pictures and the fifty-eight pages of random family charts revealed convincing historical facts about our ancestors' pioneer contributions to early Texas.

We can thank Major Day Jewell, Thelma Johnson Puckett, and Una Marie Gilbert for assembling some of the events in which our ancestors played a part. The compilers dedicated their booklet to their three brave mothers, whose beautiful pictures appeared on the dedication page. One other picture, that of Rhoda Jane Hughes Berry, Andrew Jackson Berry's wife, was included in the book.

#### OUR EARLY FAMILY HISTORIANS

Admiral William L. Mann, upon retirement from a distinguished career in the United States Navy, moved to the site of the John Berry homestead. He had bought the beautiful Berry Creek site with its springs and mill pond in 1924. Admiral Mann was not related to the Berry family, but his grandfather, R. H. Taliaferro, was an early resident of the Robertson Colony and organized the first Baptist church in Williamson County in 1848. The small congregation met for a short time in a log cabin about a mile north of what is now Round Rock. He did most of his preaching, however, on circuit throughout the region, and he often conducted Sunday services in the Berry Creek home of John and Hannah Berry.

Admiral Mann developed a great interest in the frontiersman who had first settled his family on the land he had acquired. He researched the public records about John, his children, and his wife, Hannah. In 1948, in celebration of the Williamson County Centennial, his historical research on our family was published in the *Williamson County Sun*. It was this study that first put the Berry family in its proper historical perspective.

Marshall Jackson from childhood, had heard and read accounts about the Berry boys during the San Jacinto campaign, the Plum Creek and other Indian fights, the Somervell and Mier Campaigns, their service in the Texas Rangers,



in the War against Mexico and the War Between the States. He kept a steady stream of letters flowing with all of his relatives, always trying to unearth the complete story of his forebears.

Marshall acquired a large library of books and journals about Texas history and all of the events in which the Berry children and their spouses participated. He and his brother Archie Jackson have been a vast reservoir of information gleaned from conversations with our aged cousins, aunts, and uncles who are now deceased. Fortunately, we have kept, though scattered among the family, many of his letters which reveal these early recollections about the family. Unlike most of us, he knew the untold story of our family. It was not until he, Major Jewell, Thelma Puckett, and Una Marie Gilbert combined their efforts with Admiral Mann's findings that the story came into focus as a complete family account.

Major Day Jewell spent many years after his retirement from the Army traveling throughout Texas, visiting county courthouses and public libraries in each community where some Berry child had lived. He was one of those who first urged the publication of a book with a complete genealogy of all eighteen Berry children. He stimulated such interest among our cousins living in California, Arizona, and New Mexico that many family members made the long trip to our first Association meeting. They have been coming regularly since then.

Congressman Fisher and several members of his family, have served us well in many ways and for a very long time. He has published a number of family and history books, several about the Bradberrys, Clarks, and Fishers. He served as President of the Association in 1977, has been a favorite lecturer to our annual meetings, and has patiently encouraged the book committee for a longer time than we like to confess.

Artress Walker, in the early years of our Association provided attentive audiences with an unbelievable number of new discoveries. She revealed to us the story of Bill Smothers and introduced Robert and Elsie Smothers to our Association. Elsie's excellent chapters in this book, show how much of our history we had neglected. Artress, through travel and dedicated study has made available the story about all ten children of the early American John Berry of Lincoln County, Kentucky. John Berry, born in 1742, was a veteran

of the American Revolution. Mrs. Walker continually urged the family to complete a genealogical development so we could include the entire Berry family in a book.

Robert and Elsie Smothers first came to an Association meeting at the invitation of Mrs. Walker. It was from them that we learned much about Betsy Smothers' family. Betsy's father was the subject of a story in Washington Irving's Knickerbocker Sketchbook, he served in the American Revolution, participated in the "Corn Stalk" Militia, and lived on Galveston Island before Jean LaFitte made the island his buccaneering headquarters. Bill Smothers was with the Austin party in his first exploration of Texas to select the site for his first colony. Robert Smothers, a member of our book committee passed away in his sleep while attending the 1978 meeting of the Berry Association.

Janice Knight has done more writing and genealogical study about the Berry descendants than any member of our family during the last fifteen years. In 1973, she volunteered to do the typing of articles if Jack Pope would press the family members to submit them. After two years, she and Jack determined that the way to get the complete story of our family, was to start over. This book would never have been written, but for the articles prepared by Janice.

#### OUR BERRY ASSOCIATION MEETINGS

The Berry Association has met annually since the organizational meeting at the Berry homestead in 1958. Major Jewell reported to the group at its second meeting at Lake Brownwood that he had found in Indiana the will of a William Berry that was probated in 1822. The 1961 meeting was at Lampasas where Hannah and Moses Hughes had become the first settlers in 1855. They were told by Indians about the curative springs around Lampasas, and they moved there, seeking to restore Hannah's failing health.

At the 1963 meeting in Georgetown, the Honorable Clark Fisher proposed that the Association erect a new monument over the grave of John Berry. Marshall Jackson presented a biographical sketch of William Smothers and

Artress Walker read a copy of the will executed by a John Berry in 1789 in Lincoln County, Virginia. Our cousin, O. C. Fisher had just published the interesting story of the Bradberry descendants of John Berry under the title *The Texas Heritage of the Fishers and the Clarks*.

The 1965 meeting in Abilene featured a presentation by Congressman Fisher titled "Our Kinfolks on the Texas Frontier." Dr. A. J. Pope of Abilene, just three weeks before his death, announced to the meeting that thirty-one of his descendants and their spouses were present at the meeting.

The Texas Society Daughters of 1812 honored John Berry during our 1967 session. At a public gathering at the Williamson County Courthouse, County Judge Sam V. Stone reviewed John Berry's entrance upon the Berry League in late 1846, the story of his mill and of John Berry's part as a Commissioner named by the Texas Legislature, in organizing the county and selecting the

site for the county seat. Following the courthouse ceremonies, the members assembled at the Berry cemetery where Marshall Jackson delivered a dedicatory address for the new monument over the John Berry gravesite.

Dr. George Hester from Southwestern University addressed the Association at its 1968 meeting, telling about our ancestor and the hard life of the colonists in the Robertson Colony. Following our regular meeting in Abilene in 1970, Archie and Marshall Jackson led a procession of cars to Midway Cemetery near Hawley to view the new monument set over the grave of Hannah Berry, who had died in 1904.

The Association named a book Committee in 1973 with Jack Pope as the Chairman and he was also to serve as Editor for a complete story of all eighteen children of John Berry. In addition to the Chairman, those named to serve were Gertrude Anderson, Geneva Gillman, Madolyn Hassler, Janice Knight, Thelma Puckett, and Robert and Elsie Smothers.

Colonel Harold B. Simpson, who was then writing his great book about our cousin, Audie Murphy, addressed the family at its 1974 meeting in Austin, Texas by giving us a preview of the content of the book. The next year the book, *Audie Murphy—American Soldier* was published. The highlight of the 1977 meeting was the family visit to the Grit Cemetery near Mason where there was a brief dedication ceremony for the bronze plaque prepared by the Texas Historical Commission, commemorating the life and deeds of John Bate Berry.

In 1978, the John Berry historical monument was set on the Williamson County courthouse lawn. Participating in the ceremony were Andrew Jackson Berry's daughter, Aunt Pearl Gaines, then ninety-nine years old; Drew Pope, a descendant of Betsy Smothers Berry; Mike Spurlock, a descendant of Gracie Treat Berry, and John Berry, a descendant of Hannah Devore Berry.

Jack Pope's official apology for the failure to publish this book was a standing part of every program for many years, but, in a report mailed to all members, he explained that until he retired on January 1, 1983 from the Texas Supreme Court, he would have little time to complete the book. In November, 1982 Governor Bill Clements unexpectedly appointed Jack to serve as

Chief Justice until January 1985. Until he had run his full course, he announced, it would not be possible to finish the task. But now it is done.

### DEVELOPING TRADITIONS

A growing number of our kin plan their vacations for the time of our annual meetings. Many families make the reunions an occasion for their immediate families to convene a day early. The Blackwells, Bradberrys, Browns, Fishers, Jacksons, Murphys, Nivens, Pucketts, and others have often made special efforts to gather.

A reception committee is present to greet and receive members at our annual meetings. Many in our family may be a bit confused by our complex family relationship. At first they probably do not know which one of John's wives it is, through whom they descend. This has been solved.

Red, white, and blue. If you descend from Betsy, John's first wife, you are tagged with a red ribbon. Descendants of Gracie are pinned with a white ribbon, and Hannah's descendants are decorated with a blue one. There are those present who will assist old and new members in getting them correctly decorated. The book will help.

Reunions are a time to show off. Rare old family photographs, family Bibles, heirlooms, old recipes, newspaper clippings, and family albums and scrapbooks preserve family legends. They are always present, always welcome, always needed.

Each reunion brings new members to our meetings. We welcome those interested in all branches of the Berry family.

A growing tradition is to spend time on Saturday in the assembly hall and to let things just happen. The visiting has produced our best impromptu and unprogrammed activities. We have enjoyed the delightful singing by the Bradberry sisters, the lively orchestra of the Nivens brothers, the surprising semi-classical music by Jack Cook, group singing, pantomimes, improvisation, and just good fun.

We do not work as hard to entertain the family as we used to, because we learned that the family just wants to visit. We always have a planned program, but we do not squeeze as much programming into the Saturday afternoon as we once did.

A significant part of every Sunday morning program is our worship service. These services are traditionally conducted by our own members.

Dear Mrs. Houts:-

Am always glad to hear from you even if I can't help you any. I have all my Woodford county marriage bond records indexed, and do not see any marriage of Samuel Berry. I seem to be the only one who has copied the bonds of Woodford, and they were never recorded till an enterprising visitor copied only the minister's returns some few years ago. And, of course they are very incomplete, because so many ministers never made returns of many of their marriages. Thus the bonds give many that are not on record anywhere else. The bonds have been copied by Mrs. Burns in many other counties, and as she had children to copy them in most cases, they are very much in error. The published marriage records of Mercer in the Hist. REGISTER (KY.) are badly in error. Most of them are wrong. The person who copied them did not know how to read that old penmanship, and I made many pages of corrections and gave them to the Hist. Society, but of course the published ones are filed in many libraries, tho very incorrect.

Everything indicates that Samuel and Benj. Berry were brothers, or at least they were contemporaries. Their children all married about the same period. Then, there was a Henry Berry who had a dau. to marry 1798, Lucy. Lucy was a name in all of the families of Berry.

Poor Mr. Railey made so many errors in his book. He said that Benj. Berry married first Mary Allen, then Nancy Blanton in 1804. He spoke of his first children, and named 11, and referred to 15 children, and each to get 1/15th. Then said one had died and said to be 14 divisions. He had one son and three daus. to marry Redds.

Samuel Berry died intestate about 1835, and a Mary Berry died intestate about the same period. One Samuel Berry died about 1814-1818 intestate. His name was Samuel S. Berry. To one marriage bond or note were signed Samuel B. Berry, Samuel B. Berry, Jr., and Samuel Berry, showing there were three Samuel Berrys.

When Eliz. Berry married John Hughes in 1801, a note from Samuel and Mary Berry gave consent, and stated he was from Jessamine Co., but they did not state they were Elizabeth's parents, but of course were.

I believe Samuel Berry had a son Allen W. Berry who married Sally Blanton in 1803. One Allen Berry died 1834. I would be more inclined to believe that Samuel married Mary Allen because of her name as Mary and a son named Allen. Mr. Railey is now about 87 or 9 and has been in the local hospital here for three or four years, with almost no mind. His dau. from San Antonio comes every few months and sits with him for days at a time. Sometimes he knows her and sometimes he does not. It is pathetic.

There seems to be two Samuel Berry, Jr's, sons of both Samuel and Benjamin. I have that Samuel, Jr., son of Benj., born 1781, married 1803 Sus. Heatt, and had dau. America. She may be the one who mar. Henry Searce in 1822, instead of the dau. of Samuel, Sr. It is too much of a puzzle to me to be sure about any of it, unless I went to Woodford and ran out all the estate settlements and deeds, so as to distinguish them. In case of duplicate names that usually is the only way to do it.

Lot of Mr. Railey's information he got from relatives, and a lot he got from the court records, and jumped at conclusions.



I have wills of Woodford abstracted to 1854, or thereabouts, also of Mercer and Mason and many others not quite so late. Jefferson to about 1850, and so on, but wills only tend to complicate matters sometimes, and a careful search of other records have to straighten out the conflicts.

Berry was born in Woodford Co., State of Ky. is aged 33 years, is 5 ft 10 inches high, fair complexion, blue eyes, gray hair and was by occupation a cabinet maker when mustered into the service."

In the name of God Amen I Samuel Berry of the County of Woodford, & State of Kentucky being weak of body but of sound mind and memory do make & ordain this my last Will and Testament in manner and form following:

I give and bequeath unto my loving wife Mary Berry my house and tract of land with all the improvements thereon and on which I now live containing by estimation one hundred and Seventy eight acres, also the whole of my negroes except two girls by name Esther and Hannah, with all my stock of everh kind and household and kitchen furniture to hold and enjoy the whole of the above property diring her natural life, but it is expressly my will and desire that my wife shall pay to my daughter Susanna in Stock and furniture the sum of three hundred and twelve dollars at the time of marriage or her arriving at the age of twenty one and being an equal proportion which my son Allen and my daughter Betsy Hughs and Nancy Long have received from my estate. I give and bequeath to my daughter Rachel Smith the before mentioned negro girl Esther to her and the heirs of her body forever which make her equal proportion.

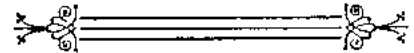
half-mile west of Alexandria, where he bought one hundred and forty acres. There he spent the remainder of his life, rearing in addition to his own family three grandchildren, making seventeen altogether. On the old homestead he died in 1868, at the age of nearly ninety-three. His wife passed away when eighty-four years old. She was an exemplary Christian woman and a member of the Baptist Church. He was a soldier in the War of 1812 and held numerous local offices in this county.

Our subject's paternal grandfather spent his entire life in Pennsylvania, where his death occurred. The maternal grandfather, also a native of the Keystone State, came to Ohio and settled in Perry County about 1809. Osmer Drake has spent his entire life (a period of seventy-six years) in Licking County, where in youth he was a student in the old-fashioned subscription schools. On the 10th of December, 1840, he married Miss Lucinda, daughter of Philip Siler, and two sons and five daughters were born of their union, namely: Ann Maria, Caroline, Alvin, Almira Josephine, Sarah Alma, LeRoy Pratt and Amanda Elizabeth, all of whom are living but Almira J. The eldest, Ann Maria, married Thomas Orr and they have five children living, Alvin II., Josephine, Mary, Lois and Osmer. Alvin married Miss Nancy Stroup, and they have one child, Dessie. Almira Josephine became the wife of Jerome Phillips, and they have five children, Maude, Lois, Romy, Dolly and Freddie. Sarah Alma, wife of John T. Wainseot, has three children living, Zorus, Pearl and Osmer Green. LeRoy Pratt married Miss Mary C. Purvis, and they have six children, Clara, Cora, Osmer, Charles, Sarah and Elmer. Amanda Elizabeth, wife of H. J. Curtis, has four children, Clifton, Alda, Clyde and Bertie.

The wife and mother died May 2, 1872, at the age of fifty-four years, and for his second wife Mr. Drake chose Miss Sarah, daughter of James Trout, of St. Alban's Township. For some years Mr. Drake was a member of the Order of Red Men, but of late years has not been actively identified with the organization. About 1843 he bought his present farm, where he has since resided continuously. His first house was a log cabin, which was

replaced by a frame building, and the latter continued to be the family residence until it was destroyed by fire about forty years ago. Afterward a substantial house was built and this has since been the family home.

Through a long and busy life that has passed the seventy-sixth milestone on the journey to immortality, Mr. Drake has shown himself to possess in an eminent degree those dominant characteristics of the sons of the Buckeye State that have made them such potent factors in the upbuilding of any community where their lot may be cast. His capability and keen insight into the best methods of conducting his financial interests, together with his plain and straightforward dealings, have placed him among the prosperous men of the county.



**J**OSIAH MCKINNEY is active in advancing the agricultural interests of Licking County and occupies a prominent position among the farmers of Newton Township. He has known no other home save the farm upon which he now resides. It is his birthplace; around it cluster the happy memories of childhood and youth; here too were passed the active days of life's prime and here he continues to reside in the afternoon of his useful and honored life.

Among the pioneers of Ohio may be mentioned the name of the late Joseph McKinney, father of our subject. He was born in Westmoreland County, Pa., July 6, 1800, and in 1814 accompanied his parents to Licking County, making settlement in Bowling Green Township. There he grew to manhood upon the home farm.
