May 12, 1990

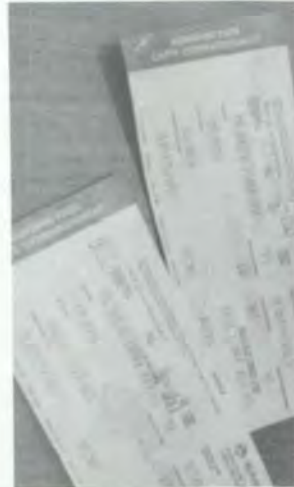
4:30 a.m. Four sponsors and eighteen students (minus three who don't own battery operated alarm clocks) departed from Highland High School to catch their 6:50 a.m. flight to Atlanta, Georgia. The previous mentioned three made it to the airport thanks to a dear dad who wanted them out of Highland for four days. Later that day...upon arrival in Atlanta the seniors found many ways to entertain themselves during a two hour layover.

About 3:00 p.m. We reached our destination Orlando, Florida. Two groups left in Budget Rent-a-Mini vans and headed for the Day's Inn. Two sponsors and three students were left at the airport to wait for Mr. Schmitz to return to take them to the motel.

Another waiting period...the group's rooms were not ready by 4:00 as planned. Therefore, swimming and checking out the surroundings kept the seniors occupied for another hour and a half.

May 13, 1990

The girls didn't perform at contest this year, but they did go and watch and felt they learned several new moves.

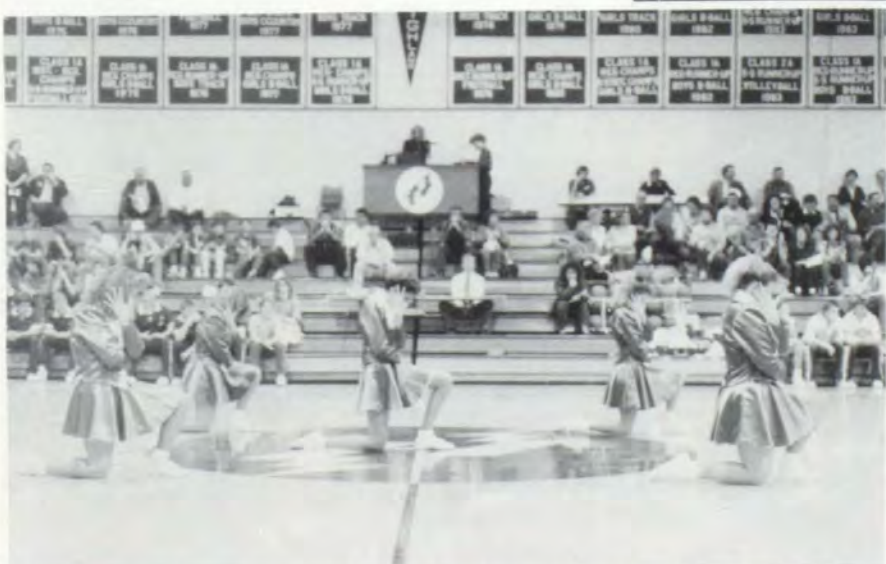

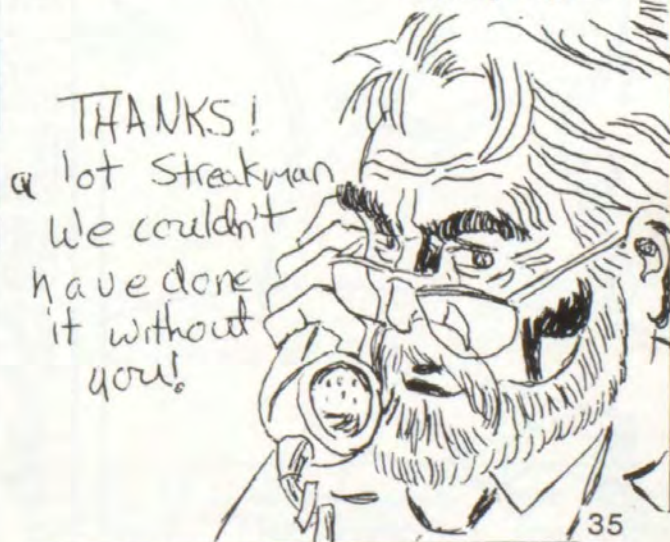

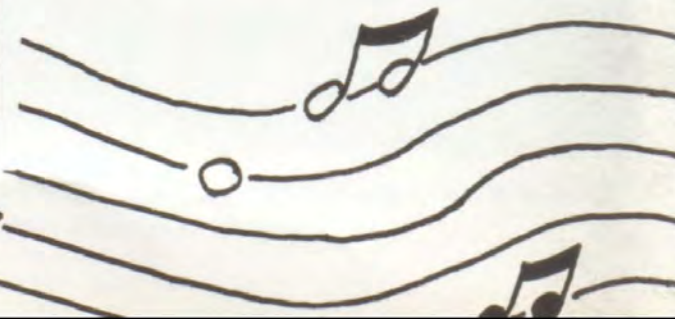

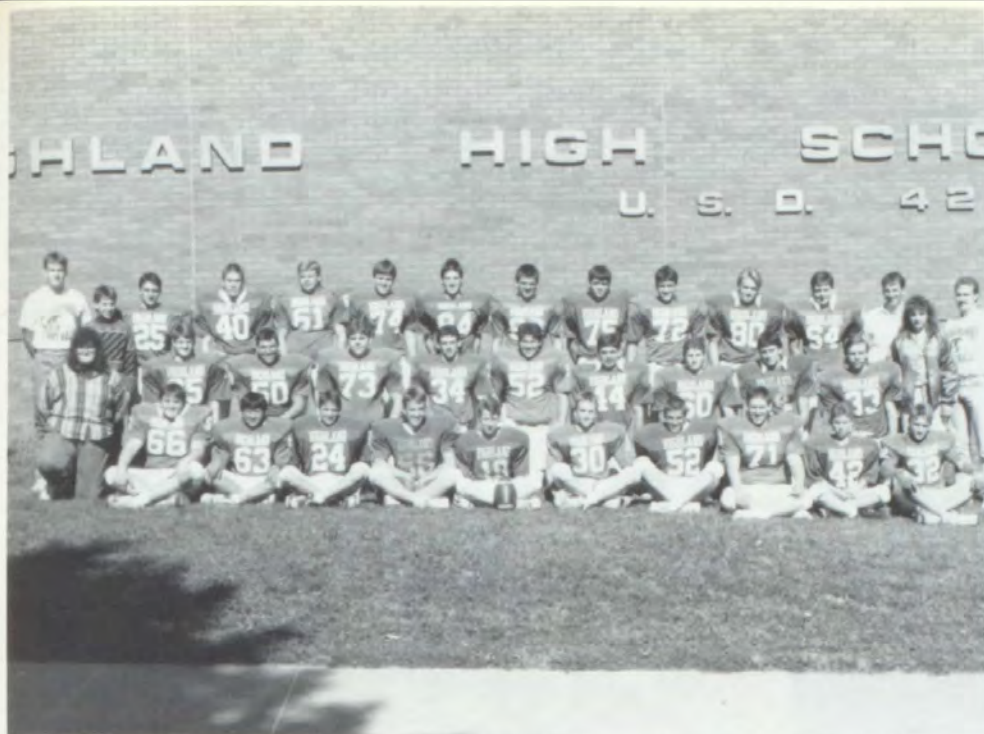

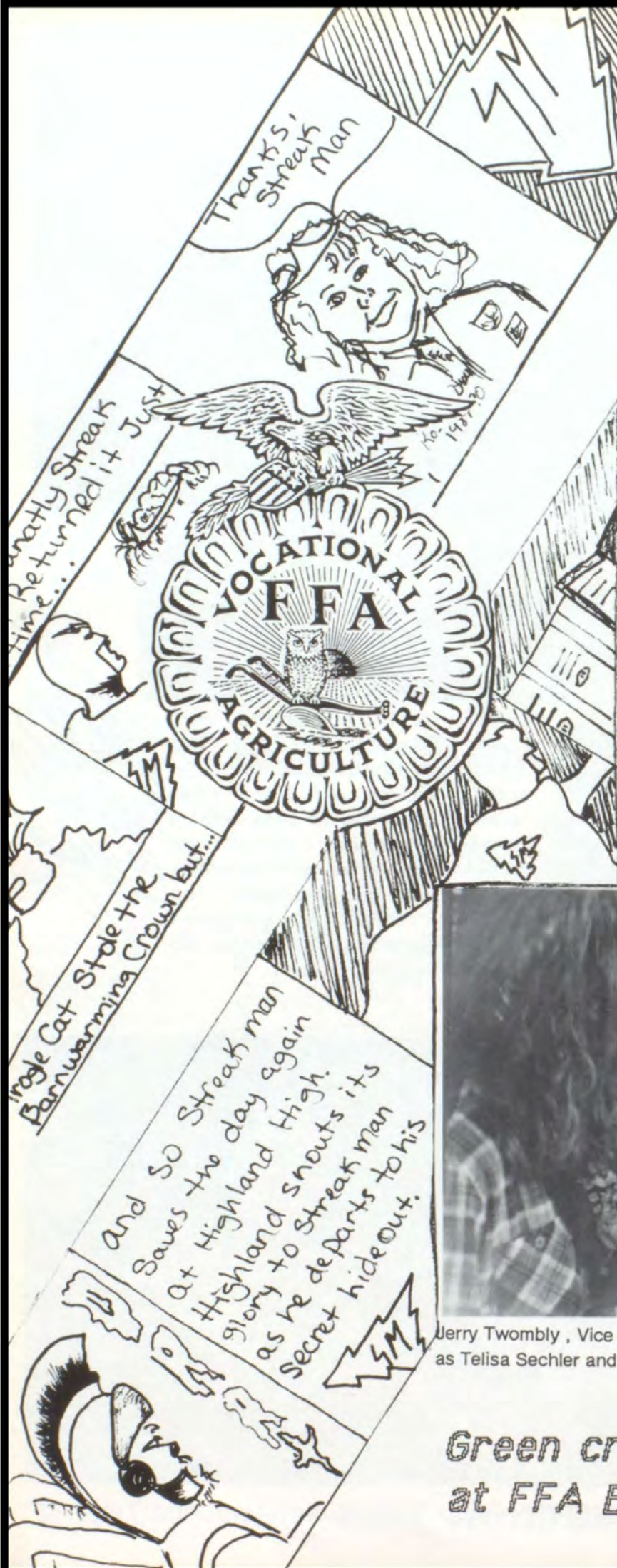
