May 12, 1990

The computer classes, taught by Sue Trant, kept very busy learning new programs and things about the new Macintosh's.














ADMINISTRATION/ BOARD join forces to make HHS better

These members are valiant and noble in the educational process for they take time out from their lives to help HHS become the best it can be. They receive no pay, (they ruled it out a few meetings ago).












