






reason math is important to life is because it helps people to organize information in their minds.

Ms. Bottom tries to be demanding about students getting their work in on time, but relaxed enough so they aren't afraid to ask questions.










definitely have learned many new parts to my own character and the characters of my students as I have balanced time between teaching and coaching. I am looking forward to improving and to being a better instructor in the future."



Social Studies Hot Coffee and Hot Topics




Mr. Elden Ninemire, who is famous for going through about three or four cups of coffee a day, has taught at Midway for 20 years.





Staying In Shape






Volleyball! A Spark of Spirit

The varsity season got off to a good start with a victory over Dekalb and a victory over Highland. This was the first time in 8 years that the Eagles have beaten the Bluestreaks.






top right **OFFENSE JV.** Staci Wohletz, freshman, spikes the ball against Highland as the rest of the team readies for block coverage.











"It was a nice to have everyone there to sign your yearbook and I will always remember it," said Audrey Caudle, senior.










