
The state contest was held on campus of the University of Kansas. A total of 124 schools competed and 1,504 were judged.

Students who have been chosen to be inducted are recognized at the NHS induction ceremony where they sign a scroll that every member has signed since the Troy club

was chartered in 1939.

In charge of conducting the ceremony were the carry-over members from last year, Stephanie Adams, Kelsey Thomas, and Bethany Jenkins.





My K-12 grade teachers, you guys have been great. I thank you all for everything you have done for me. I'm going to miss you.


To all of my coaches, you guys have been great. The seasons we have shared together have been very memorable.


Once we were seated, we looked at the many paintings and western décor. It made the restaurant seem more like home and more interesting.





I remember listening to him speak at the 8th-grade gradu-


ation. I loved his "Top 10" list about the current senior class.




Trojans earn two 2^{nds} at County Meet

The lady Trojan volleyball team was under a new coach this year. They all received awards of participation, and many received letters. Abby Winder was the only one who received an All-League honor.


